


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Catchment Zones


NSW Public <u>School</u> <u>Finder</u> shows our local enrolment area.

- Attend the enrolment appointment, bringing originals of all documents submitted online.




When should my child start school?

Legal Requirements

Parents may enrol their child in Kindergarten at the beginning of the school year if the child turns 5 years of age on or before 31 July in that year.

The Education Act 1990 mandates that all children must be in compulsory schooling by 6 years of age.

- Social competence
- Emotional maturity
- Language and cognitive skills
- Communication skills
- Physical health and wellbeing (gross and fine motor skills)





Checklist Personal/Independence Skills Can your child...?

NKPS Kindergarten Readiness



Go to the toilet independently

Wash and dry hands independently

Dress themselves e.g. put on/remove jacket

Use a tissue effectively to blow nose

Manage lunchbox e.g. unwrap lunch and snacks and peel fruit

Recognise his/her name in print

Take care of own belongings e.g. put bag in a designated place

Recognise belongings amongst others e.g. hat or raincoat

Unpack/pack own school bag independently

Social/Communication Skills Can your child...?



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Sit still and listen to a story for a few minutes

Play cooperatively with other children - share and take turns

Wait patiently for several minutes for adult attention

Comply with requests, stop activity when requested

Speak without shouting or whispering		
Inititate and sustain conversations with	adults and other children	
Recite rhymes and sing songs		
Follow a single instruction	-20	ana ana
Respond to spoken questions		-
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Use scissors to cut along a straight line or cut simple shapes

Hold a pencil in an appropriate grip

Communicate needs and express feelings

Draw recognisable pictures of people

Manage stairs, obstacles and uneven ground independently

Use a variety of materials (pens, pencils, textas, paintbrushes) to draw or scribble or to write

Gross & Fine Motor Skills -

Play imaginatively (indoors and outdoors)



English – What To Expect And Ways To Prepare Your Child

What will my child learn in Kindergarten?

- Oral language and communication
- Vocabulary
- Phonological awareness
- Print conventions
- Phonic knowledge
- Reading fluency
- Reading comprehension
- Creating written texts
- Spelling
- Handwriting
- Understanding and responding to literature





English – How Do We Teach Literacy?

- Collaborative planning and co-teaching
- Explicit and systematic approach
- Use of data to inform differentiated instruction
- Learning Intentions and Success Criteria
- Gradual release of responsibility (I do, We do, You do)
- Use of decodable texts
- Use of mentor texts for reading comprehension and writing instruction

English – Helping My Child At Home

Oral language and communication

- Talk with your child about a range of topics
- Describe or talk about things as they are happening
- Listen to your child and encourage them to take turns
- When starting a conversation or when talking with your child **ask questions** that require more than a yes or no reply
- When asking questions give your child time to answer
- Make conversations fun make up rhymes, talk and sing with your child
- Use describing words when talking
- Build on your child's language by teaching them new words
- Practise using new words in a sentence



English – Helping My Child At Home

Reading

- Make reading fun and enjoyable
- Let your child choose and re-read books they are interested in
- Talk about the book before you start reading it
- Discuss the pictures and how they add to the story
- After reading talk about the story
- Choose books that have rhymes or riddles in them
- Talk about rhyming words. Cat, hat, sat, bat are all examples of words that rhyme because they sound the same at the end
- Play with rhyming words and play rhyming games. Make silly rhyming sentences such as, "Have you ever seen a snail deliver the mail?"
- Have fun with the sound of letters. Make up silly sentences using words that start with the same sound such as, "Many mice munching meatballs."



English – Helping My Child At Home

Drawing and Writing

- Have fun with drawing and writing. Ask your child to draw or write about things they like to do, make or play

- Encourage your child to talk about their writing. This could include talking about their scribbles, drawings, letters or words

- Use different materials to draw and write with such as chalk, paper and pencils, markers, pens and keyboards
- Ask your child to write their name





Mathematics – What To Expect And Ways To Prepare Your Child

What will my child learn in Kindergarten?

- Number and algebra
 - Representing whole numbers Combining and separating quantities Forming groups
- Measurement and space
 - Geometric measure 2D and 3D spatial structure Non-spatial measure
- Statistics and probability.

Mathematics – How Do We Teach Numeracy?

- Connectionist approach: teaching big ideas
- Collaborative planning and co-teaching
- Explicit teaching practices
- Learning Intentions and Success Criteria
- Use of data to inform differentiated instruction
- Gradual release of responsibility (I do, We do, You do)
- Number talks
- Concrete materials and play-based learning



Mathematics – Helping My Child At Home

- Play board games together that use dice and counting
- Ask your child to find numbers when going on a walk
- Talk about the numbers on everyday items such as clocks and phones
- Read and share stories. Talk about counting, amounts, and the numbers you see in a book, including the page numbers
- Count when you do things around the house count forwards and backwards
- Listen to counting songs One, Two, Buckle My Shoe, Five Little Ducks, Five Cheeky Monkeys Jumping on the Bed
- Play clapping games where you clap a pattern, and your child repeats the pattern
- Add amounts of everyday items, toys, fruit, books. Children may use their fingers to add.
- When eating count how many items you have. Ask questions such as, "How many grapes have you eaten? How many are left?"






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
What is Best Start

- Best Start is a state-wide assessment that helps teachers identify the literacy and numeracy skills of each student at the beginning of Kindergarten.
- All children start school with different abilities, and it is important that teachers identify their knowledge, skills and understanding.
- An appointment day and time will be provided to you.
- The interview may not necessarily be completed by your child's teacher for 2024.
- The interview will take about 40 minutes.
- Parents will be provided with feedback about how you can support your child during the first year at school.




2024 Kindergarten Classes
